2019 Course Schedule

July 8 - 12: Geshe Tenzin Dorjee, Deer Park's abbot, will give a commentary on Lama Tsong Khapa's <u>The Concise</u> Treatise on the Stages of the Path to Enlightenment (lam rim bsdus don).

July 15 - 19: Geshe Tenzin Sherab, one of Deer Park's excellent resident teachers, will review and then continue his commentary on **Arya Nagarjuna's** Suhrillekha, Letter to a Friend (A Friendly Letter - bshes pa'i 'phring), based on Ven. Rendawa's commentary.

July 22 - 26: Geshe Tenzin Sherab will give a commentary on Acharya Kamalashila's <u>Middle Stages of Meditation</u> (bsgom rim bar pa).

Further Notes on the Texts:

- <u>The Concise Treatise on the Stages of the Path to Enlightenment</u>, also known as <u>The Song of Spiritual Experience</u> or <u>Lines of Experience</u> (lam rim nyams mgur), is counted among the 18 great Lam Rim (Stages of the Path) texts studied by scholars and practitioners, and presents the entire path to Enlightenment in 25 verses. Several electronic versions of the English translation are listed below and can be downloaded and printed for use during the course:

- Arya Nagarjuna's Suhrillekha, A Letter to a Friend, is a "poetic presentation of the fundamental teachings of the Great Vehicle, or Mahayana, and is remarkable for its concise style and memorable imagery, making it one of the most widely quoted sources in other commentaries on the Mahayana path. The great Indian Buddhist master Nagarjuna (first-second century C.E.) wrote his celebrated poem "Letter to a Friend" as a gift of advice to a South Indian king, and it has since become a monument in the Indian shastra tradition." "Despite its short length (only 123 verses), it covers the whole Mahayana path ...". Text availability:

 - A translation of Venerable Rendawa's commentary on A Letter to a Friend by Geshe Lobsang Tharchin and Artemus Engle is available at the Library of Tibetan Works & Archives and at Mahayana Sutra & Tantra Press.
- Acharya Kamalashila's <u>Middle Stages of Meditation</u> is considered a meditation manual and is a favorite of His
 Holiness the Dalai Lama who has said, "This text can be like a key that opens the door to all other major Buddhist
 scriptures." Text availability:
 - <u>Stages of Meditation</u> by His Holiness the Dalai Lama includes the English translation and Tibetan of the root text plus His Holiness' commentary on the text.
 - <u>The Stages of Meditation Middle Volume</u> is a translation of the root text by Venerable Geshe Sopa, Venerable Elvin Jones, and John Newman, published by Deer Park. Copies of this translation will be available for course attendees who need it.
 - Many Deer Park students will already have one or both of these texts. Please bring your copy if you already have them.

Prerequisites: There are no prerequisites, though a familiarity with Mahayana Buddhist study and practice would be helpful.
